DSBN SKills Competition:

Grade 9 students Lucas Penlington and Jason Liang travelled to Toronto with their mentor Mr. Fletcher and Team DSBN to compete in the Ontario Technological Skills Competition. Secondary and post-secondary students from across Ontario compete in challenges that test the skills to be proficient in various careers. Lucas and Jason used GIS software to determine the hotspots of personal and property crimes in Ottawa. They were the only grade 9 students competing against a strong field of grade 11 and 12 students. Even though they did not win a medal, Mr. Fletcher is very proud of how well they did in completing the challenge. They both had a positive experience and will be better prepared for next year. This year, members of Team DSBN won 6 gold, 5 silver and 1 bronze medal and Team DSBN won the "top school board of Ontario" for overall achievement at the competition.

Red Dress Day:

May 5th is known as **Red Dress Day**. It's a day to honour and remember the thousands of Indigenous women, girls, and two-spirit people who have gone missing or have been victims of violence. Sadly, Indigenous women and girls are far more likely to experience violence than other women in Canada, and for many families, justice has still not been found.



These dresses are a powerful symbol. They represent the loved ones who are no longer with us and remind us of the work we still need to do to ensure safety, respect, and equality for Indigenous communities.

As part of our school's commitment to raising awareness and showing support, we hung red dresses in our foyer and we used our lacrosse buyout to raise money for organizations that support Indigenous families and communities affected by this tragedy. By participating and donating, you are helping to fund programs that provide support, healing, and advocacy for families who have lost someone.
